Someone To Talk To

...weaving a tapestry of love and action...

We say these words when we dedicate the dollars we collect as Sunday offering. But we weave the tapestry in other ways, too.

We have been living in an era of ongoing cultural change. Our social patterns and expectations remain in flux. Perhaps in earlier days, centuries ago, there were more stable truths about living that parents could pass down by example and word to their children. Perhaps our lives have



gotten more complicated. And here in the United States it's common for us to move to a different city, state or even across the country for career advancement which can separate us from networks of family and friendship which can provide us with support and a place to reflect on the challenges we face in life. And there are some life events that are always challenging no matter how well connected and supported we may be.

Sometimes we need someone to talk to beyond our circle of friends and family. Your ministers are available for helpful conversations about the challenges and opportunities of life. We are especially available for conversations about meaning and purpose, about mortality, about wholeness, and integrity. We can sometimes help with forgiveness, and brokenness in relationships. Mostly we help by listening, caring, holding your difficult experiences with you in confidence, and providing perspective.

Gail and I both have training and experience in pastoral counseling which helps us establish a connection with you. We help you assess what is going on, respond to your spiritual needs, and identify other resources you might benefit from connecting with. To balance our other responsibilities to the Congregation and stay within the scope of our training and expertise, we can usually offer one to four conversations of about an hour, usually spread over several weeks or months. Gail's responsibilities leading the staff and sharing Congregation leadership with the Board President and other members of the Board of Trustees force her to be very selective with regard to when she can be available for one-on-one pastoral engagement. Pastoral Care is a major focus of my work with the church. If you are a Congregant I will get you on my calendar.

We can also help you identify times when an extended relationship with a helping professional might be beneficial and help you find a counselor who might be a good fit for you.

To help Gail and me provide Congregants the best possible referrals for counseling by dedicated helping professionals we could use your help. If you have experience with receiving counseling from an area professional and would be willing to share their name and contact information it will help Gail and me build our base for referring others for help. It would be most useful to hear something about what area you sought help with from them and how well you felt served.

Help us in "weaving a tapestry of love and action" by sharing your experiences of counseling relationships here in southeast Michigan. Your experiences, shared, will help us support others in the months and years ahead. Send them to me in the church office or by email at mark@uuaa.org.

The Coming of Age Program, as with the SGD program itself, only works because of the dedicated volunteers who make it happen each Sunday, each year. Each Sunday a representative of the Children and Youth Program will be present in the Social Hall to answer any question you may have.

We often times advertise the need for adult volunteers. Throughout the year I am also asked if there are ways a youth, a family or other group can volunteer their time to serve our Congregation. Yes, there are! Because of the requests I have received I began keeping a list of opportunities available here at UUAU. Below is my current list of volunteer opportunities for youth, families and adults. This is by no means exhaustive. If you are interested in finding another way to serve our Congregation through volunteer work in the SGD program for a fixed amount of time this summer, let me know!

Volunteer Opportunities Within SGD Program:

- Gather books from our library which are needed for next year's classroom curricula.
- Organize a classroom and prepare it for next year's teaching team.
- Test the classroom markers, keeping only the ones which still work (my family's favorite!).
- Serve as Food Gatherers Event Coordinator.
- Transfer data from VHS tapes to DVDs for use in 4th/5th grade Bibleodeon class.
- Serve as a member of our Children's Welcoming Counsel, a teaching team, or Children and Youth Committee.
- Offer an adult education class.
- Serve as a 9th grade Coming of Age mentor.
- Be a Sunday morning greeter - this is something parents can do with their children.

I'd like to fill you in on what the Spiritual Growth and Development Program has in store for this summer. It's a busy time!

The SGD Summer Program launched on Sunday, May 19. Our theme is *Bible Heroes and Beyond*, a curriculum developed by SGD Program Assistant Debra Golden. Young folks will explore what it means to be a heroic person, and how the lives and teachings of heroes - some historical, some legendary, and some local - exemplify UU values. Look for children and youth wearing white baseball caps decorated with hero symbols and themes, the fruit of our first week's activity.



Some important events for our older youth are on the horizon. On Sunday, June 2, the YRUU twelfth grade students will participate in the traditional Bridging Out ceremony, in which the Congregation honors their passage from High School to the next phase of their journeys as young adult UUs.

On Sunday, June 9, the ninth grade Coming of Age students will present their Credo essays to the Congregation. Each student has spent the year reflecting on her or his beliefs and engaging in conversation and exploration with other students, the COA teaching team, and the adult mentor with whom she or he has been matched. The result is a collection of uniquely wonderful Credo essays, which will be read aloud during the service.

The annual YRUU Service Trip is scheduled for July 22 through the 27. In this event, the fun and excitement of a road trip combines with the living out of UU values. This year, YRUU youth and adult volunteers will travel to Chicago to participate in a Habitat for Humanity building project, and perhaps partake of some deep-dish pizza. It could happen.

The SGD Summer Program will close on Sunday, September 1. The following week, Sunday, September 8, will mark the return of the two-service schedule and the celebration of the multi-generational Water Communion. The SGD regular program year for 2013- 2014 will begin on Sunday, September 15.

If you do not have an advance directive, *Five Wishes* will be a highly informational workshop for you, regardless of your age. If you already have an advance directive, this program offers a chance for you to review your choices.
