My introverted self has grown addicted to this annual tradition. I've only missed once since that first time in 2009. A few of my brothers have not missed a single one in 18 years.

Each year we have a theme which helps shape our activities and conversations, but always in the spirit of fulfilling our most important goal, which is to have fun, to make meaningful connections with other men, and to grow our community.

This year we will explore something very basic to our existence as a group. What does it mean to be someone who identifies as a man? What does it mean for you? How has that changed over time? Is it different for UU men? Does our awareness of the harm we have done to women change our understanding or responsibilities? How about our understanding of gender as a continuum rather than a binary? What personal stories and perspectives would you like to bring to the conversation? Together, we can create a "Field Guide to Being a UU Man in 2018."

This year, delegates will pick an issue to become the Congregational Study/Action Issue (CSAI) for UU congregations throughout the country to study and act on for the next two years.

If you are a member of the congregation in good standing, and you are planning to attend GA, you can be a delegate. UUAA members who aren't going to Kansas City can be off-site delegates by watching the general sessions streamed live and by using an online tool to vote. Being an off-site delegate costs a lot less than travelling to GA in person.

UUs for Justice in the Middle East (UUJME) News

Statement from UUJME on the Attacks on Gaza Protesters

Over the past six weeks, Israeli snipers shot and killed over 100 unarmed protesters and severely wounded thousands more near the fence separating Gaza from Israel. The purpose of "The Great March of Return" was to protest the denial by Israel of Palestinian refugees to return to the homes and villages from which they were expelled in 1948, a right guaranteed by the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. Over 70% of the 1.9 million people living in the Gaza strip are refugees from villages located in what is now Israel. They also protested the deplorable living conditions resulting from the 11-year siege and blockade imposed on Gaza by Israel and Egypt. On May 14, Palestinians protested the opening of the U.S. Embassy in Jerusalem.

Most of the victims were shot more than 100 meters away from the fence, many while running away or simply standing within 500 meters. None of the protesters posed a threat to Israeli citizens or soldiers. Some protesters cut through a barbed wire barrier, but did not damage the 10-foot high metal fence. Shooting unarmed protesters with live ammunition, even when they throw stones, burn tires, or attempt to breach a barrier, is a war crime under international law. Sharpshooters also wounded and killed journalists and medics wearing clearly identifiable clothing. The killings were completely unjustified. The fence could easily be protected by non-lethal means.

Expanding bullets made in the USA contributed to the high death rate and permanently disabling injuries. In an act of American hegemony and arrogance, UN Ambassador Nikki Haley blocked a Security Council initiative to investigate the Gaza shootings and walked out as the Palestinian envoy began to speak. Like the Civil Rights and South African Anti-Apartheid Movements, it's time for faith communities to reset our nation's moral compass on the side of freedom, justice, and equality. Our congregation can do its part by adopting a resolution affirming the Palestinian call for Boycott, Divestment, and Sanctions ([BDS](#)) against Israel.

Unitarian Universalist Service Committee (UUSC) News



Rev. Mary Katherine Morn has been named the new President and CEO of UUSC. She has served the organization as the chief development officer for the last four years. Prior to her term at UUSC she served UU

congregations in Georgia, Tennessee, and Virginia, where her outreach to the community was a prominent part of her ministry.

In announcing Rev. Morn's selection from a group of well-qualified candidates, Rev. Dr. Lyssa Jenkins, chairman of the board, said "Her leadership has been anchored in our commitment to the work of justice and focused on building teams and resourcing a transformative mission through partnerships. "

This month's featured project is the effort of UUSC to end the criminalization of refugees in the US. Immigration and Customs Enforcement officers treat refugees as if they are criminals. Through a system of five partner organizations, UUSC tries to cover the needs of this group. The Refugee and Immigration Center for Education and Legal Services (RAICES) provides legal services to help asylum seekers through the process of applying for asylum. Justice in Motion protects migrants as they cross the border and ensures they know their legal rights. Those held in detention work through [CIVIC](#), which has expanded the national hotline to allow detainees to contact family and seek legal assistance. UUSC conducted research to verify U.S. border controls "chase and scatter" tactic with our partner No More Deaths. Scalibrini is the fifth partner which has helped accompany 220 migrant/asylum seekers from Mexico across the border.
