CLIMATE ACTION | CLIMATE JUSTICE

The Climate Action | Climate Justice group plays an active role in the congregation's work responding to the broad-reaching social justice issues that climate change creates in our community and our world. In May of 2020, our congregation named climate justice and environmentalism as priority work to take on as a whole community. (See [A Congregational Vision](#).) Climate Action's mission broadened to include climate justice. We set goals to lower our carbon footprint, work toward Zero Waste, expand our climate justice awareness and more. To help us reach our goals, a Climate Action / Climate Justice Leadership Team enrolled UUAA in the [Unitarian Universalist Association's \(UUA\) Green Sanctuary 2030 certification program](#) and is overseeing action plans for new climate work. IMMIGRATION ACTION COALITION

The Immigration Action Coalition works to educate ourselves and others about migrant justice issues, advocates for immigration reform, and acts in support of our local immigrant community. We educate our community about the history and current situation in Israel/Palestine. We oppose U.S. military, diplomatic and financial support that perpetuates Israeli human rights abuses and war crimes. Restorative Justice focuses on raising community awareness of healing alternatives to the current punitive justice system in our community. Guided by UUAA's vision for social justice and our UU principles, UUCivs responds to current societal and political challenges. FOOD & SHELTER

ALPHA HOUSE—INTERFAITH HOSPITALITY NETWORK (IHN)

Alpha House was founded by UUAA and other congregations over 30 years ago as a community response to family homelessness. Congregants work with IHN staff and others to support up to 6 families living there. For each Host Week (which happens four times a year), ~100 UUAA volunteers cook and serve dinner, supervise children's activities, and make a hot breakfast on weekends. HABITAT FOR HUMANITY

UUAA is part of an interfaith group of 13 area congregations, the "Good News Group" that has been working in partnership with Habitat for Humanity of Huron Valley since 1997. In that time, we have helped 35 families (with over 70 children) move into affordable, energy efficient homes, usually foreclosed homes purchased by Habitat for Humanity and renovated by a combination of skilled labor and volunteers. UUAA donates over \$7,000 yearly toward construction costs and provides work site volunteers. We help families, neighborhoods, and the environment—and we laugh and have fun doing it. FOOD JUSTICE TEAM

The Food Justice Team advocates for human health and animal welfare while promoting equitable food systems that sustain the environment, alleviate hunger and support farm and food workers. Our goals are: 1) Environmental: Working toward zero-waste at congregational events; educating our congregation and the wider community; 2) Racial Justice: Meeting local farmers/people of color, discussing their needs, assisting where needed; exploring treatment of food and farm workers. OUTREACH

JACKSON SOCIAL WELFARE FUND

Through a 1955 bequest from George L. and Bessie Jackson, the congregation funds projects that advance the First Amendment to the U.S. Constitution or support peaceful means of conflict resolution. Annually, the Jackson Social Welfare Fund committee evaluates proposals and allocates funds to several local, regional, and national organizations. KHASI HILLS OF INDIA

The Khasi Hills Sponsor-a-Student Program links donors from the Ann Arbor congregation with individual students (pre-school through Class V) at the Mawkisyiem Unitarian Lower Primary School in the Khasi Hills in northeast India. Each annual donation of \$50 helps the school by supplementing teacher salaries, helping to fund new infrastructure, assisting with book and uniform purchases, and providing a year-end gift for each student. PRISON BOOKS PROGRAM

The Prison Books Team provides some Michigan prisons and the county jail with used books for adult education and recreation, working with the prison librarians. We also provide children's books to the jail and women's prison in collaboration with Washtenaw Literacy. We collect books from local libraries, organizations, and individual donations and deliver to the facilities. We have delivered between 10,000 and 15,000 books per year since 2006. Volunteers are needed to gather, sort, pack, and deliver books, using their own vehicles. Contact PrisonBooks@uuuaa.org.

PARTNER CHURCH IN ROMANIA

UUAA's partnership with the Unitarian Church of Kézdivásárhely, Romania (Transylvania) began in 1997. This partnership provides a spiritually stimulating, mutually respectful, culturally sensitive, personal, active, and long-term collaboration with a congregation which shares our values. We work together to identify ways to mutually support each other and learn each other's heritage and culture through visits, Facebook, and other means. We provide financial assistance for their church and its sister church in Szentivánlaborfalva, their mutual minister, and college students. SHARING THE COLLECTION
