## ALPHA HOUSE—INTERFAITH HOSPITALITY NETWORK (IHN)

Alpha House was founded by UUAA and other congregations over 25 years ago as a community response to family homelessness. Congregants work with IHN staff and others to support up to 6 families living there. For each Host Week (which happens four times a year), ~100 UUAA volunteers cook and serve dinner, supervise children's activities, make a hot breakfast on weekends, contact each day's volunteers, and donate money. ## HABITAT FOR HUMANITY

UUAA is part of an interfaith group of 16 area congregations, the "Good News Group" that has been working in partnership with Habitat for Humanity of Huron Valley since 1997. In that time, we have helped 33 families (with over 65 children) move into affordable, energy efficient homes, usually foreclosed homes purchased by Habitat for Humanity and renovated by a combination of skilled crews and volunteers. UUAA donates over \$7,000 toward construction costs and provides work site volunteers. We help families, neighborhoods, and the environment—and we laugh and have fun doing it. ## OUTREACH

### JACKSON SOCIAL WELFARE FUND

Through a 1955 bequest from George L and Bessie Jackson, the congregation funds projects that advance the First Amendment to the U.S. Constitution or support peaceful means of conflict resolution. Annually, the Jackson Social Welfare Fund committee evaluates proposals and allocates funds to several local, regional, and national organizations. ### KHASI HILLS OF INDIA

The Khasi Hills Sponsor-a-Student Program links donors from the Ann Arbor congregation with individual students (pre-school through Class V) at the Mawkisyiem Unitarian Lower Primary School in the Khasi Hills in northeast India. Each annual donation of \$50 helps the school by supplementing teacher salaries, helping to fund new infrastructure, assisting with book and uniform purchases, and providing a year-end gift for each student. ### PARTNER CHURCH IN ROMANIA

UUAA's partnership with the Unitarian Church of Kézdivásárhely, Romania (Transylvania) began in 1997. This partnership provides a spiritually stimulating, mutually respectful, culturally sensitive, personal, active, and long-term collaboration with a congregation which shares our values. We work together to identify ways to mutually support each other and learn each other's heritage and culture through visits, Facebook, and other means. We provide financial assistance for their church and its sister church in Szentivanlaborfalva, their mutual minister, and college students. Our relationship enhances understanding of Unitarian religious heritage and the people of another

### PRISON BOOKS PROGRAM

The Prison Books Team provides some Michigan prisons and the county jail with used books for adult education and recreation, working with the prison librarians. We also provide children's books to the jail and women's prison in collaboration with Washtenaw Literacy. We collect books from local libraries, organizations, and individual donations and deliver to the facilities. We have delivered between 10,000 and 15,000 books per year since 2006.
